

A THEMATIC ANALYSIS OF THE KUDUMBA SHREE SELF-HELP GROUP PROGRAMMES (2020–2025)

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ABSTRACT

The social impact of Self-Help Groups (SHGs) on women's empowerment and social inclusion is an ever-vibrant global topic. In India, a lot of studies have analysed the role of these self-help groups in fostering women's economic, social, and political inclusion, moulding leadership skills, and strengthening physical and psychological wellness. In Kerala, the State Poverty Eradication Mission, Kudumbashree, started Neighbourhood SHGs (NHGs) with the aim of poverty eradication and women's empowerment and their social inclusion. It consists of a three-tier structure with Neighbourhood Groups (NHGS) working like SHGS as primary level units, Area Development Societies (ADS) at the ward level, and Community Development Societies (CDS) at the local government level. While the community network is formed around the central themes of poverty eradication and women's empowerment, its main features include democratic leadership and support structures formed from the 'Kudumbashree family'. There will be 10 - 20 members in each self-help group representing their homes.

Kudumbashree has successfully linked with major government initiatives like the National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM) and MGNREGS and designed and implemented many empowerment programs, including Microfinance, Economic Entrepreneurship Development, the Haritha Karma Sena, and the Ashraya destitute rehabilitation project to realise the dream of women's inclusion and encourage women's representation in societies and welfare programmes. With approximately 46 lakh members in its core groups, Kudumbashree constitutes one of the largest women's movements in Asia. The mission continuously updates its empowerment agenda by planning various initiatives, entrepreneurship, empowerment programmes and also expanding its network through the formation of Auxiliary Groups for young women and students, Balasabha for teenagers, aiming to bridge generational gaps and leverage their capacity for social development, career development

The purpose of this study is to consolidate those studies conducted in Kerala on Kudumbashree from 2020 to 2025, synthesising their social relevance, key themes, trends, challenges, and opportunities, and proposing valid policy recommendations. It analyses the updating of the SHG programmes and its extension to social and political participation

Primary Objectives:

- 1. To assess updating of the Kudumbashre SHG programme for women's economic, social, and political empowerment in Kerala and its impacts
- 2. To evaluate the effectiveness of SHGs programmes in fostering leadership and democratic political, social participation among women and maintaining the social harmony of Kerala
- 3. To analyse the new extension of Kudumbashree and its effort to bridge the generation gap
- 4. To identify gaps in existing research and propose future directions for SHG-based interventions. **Thematic Analysis (Synthesis of Findings)**: This study proves that Kudumbashree updated its programme and formed supporting groups by understanding the necessity of society and the relevance of the social welfare programme. They utilise this platform for women to mould active leaders and decision-makers, to empower their roles in all segments of society, breaking all male dominance. Furthermore, the network has demonstrated the capacity to act as a community-based safety net, notably in developing psychosocial care skills for disaster-affected populations.it shows that the role of Kudumbashree in making our society a peaceful community

Research Methodology: This study is based purely on secondary data. Sources were selected from Google Scholar and reputed Indian and peer-reviewed journals, using key phrases such as "social inclusion women," "Self-help groups Kerala," and "trends and challenges." Innovative programmes for social inclusion, women's empowerment. Data was also collected from the official reports of the Kudumbashree Mission, the State Planning Board, and other relevant government departments.

Limitations of the Study: The core limitation of this review is the absence of primary data, as the study is based entirely on secondary sources. This reliance necessitates careful consideration of potential biases inherent in the selected body of existing research.

ANALYSIS AND DISCUSSION

The present study focuses on the various initiatives and programmes successfully implemented by Kudumbahree, a government-supported NGO established by the Kerala State Poverty Eradication Mission, with the objective of poverty eradication and women's empowerment. It started with a few agendas and programmes of empowerment. When it connected with Central government schemes and programmes, it became broader and widespread. I expect that a gradual evolution may happen to the Kudumbashree programme when it continues its journey over 25 years since 1998. When we analyse the above journals thematically, we can see the position of Kerala Kudembashrees compared to other SHGs from various parts of our country. The first journal reveals that significant regional variations in outcomes exist, with southern states like Kerala and Tamil Nadu showing. But that study tells us, even though it made wonderful changes, Self-help empowering programmes exposed women to new forms of exploitation, including political instrumentalisation in various parts of our countries. Especially in northern and eastern states, where patriarchal structures and weak governance systems limit women's genuine agency. Even though the topic 'Impact of self-help groups in women empowerment: with special reference to Ernakulam district,' checks all the dimensions of this impact without neglecting any silly points in this empowerment area. The papers, "Increasing the Women's Empowerment through Kudumbashree in Kerala Region, Entrepreneurial Activities of Women Self-Help Groups and Improvement in Quality of Life and Standard of Living of Members", check how this empowerment leads its members to a quality of life. However, its measurement scale is based solely on physical infrastructure, income level, and education. That may be a limitation of time and resources. A comprehensive study is to be conducted, considering physical and mental well-being as a part of quality of life. "Impact of sustainable development on women through Kudumbashree" is a traditional topic. But it viewed the improvement through the eyes of sustainable development. Multifaceted improvement, Grass root improvement, also discussed here. "Social capital and social cohesion within the context of the Kudumbashree", Examining how this collective togetherness built on microfinance utilises it possibly by making social bonds and trust cohesion, and making strong social capital. Now we need such collectiveness and trust, and sharing space, as we all are isolated during the time of individualism and privatisation are becoming stronger than we face. Apart from financial improvement, it maintains a peaceful harmony between communities. More traditional cooperative systems and informal economic systems are to be developed using this social capital. The paper, "A Critical Look Through a feminist Lens", critically examines whether the microfinance model used by the Kerala government in its Kudumbashree scheme was successful in both reducing poverty and enhancing the social capital of women. This is also pinpointing issues. The author suggests that to grow the social capital of women beyond current cultural and societal norms, the state must become actively involved in social reconstruction alongside the continuation of the Kudumbashree scheme. Currently, there is an absence of effort to change gendered positions in society. A structural review of Kudumbashree is necessary, and alterations must be made to cement its fundamental objectives and close societal loopholes

"Entrepreneurial Initiatives of Women Self-Help Groups to Facilitate Sustainable Tourism: A Case Study with reference to Kudumbashree by Pazhoor," explores tourism-related entrepreneurial activities of self-help groups in association with LED by promoting sustainable tourism by conserving our traditional heritage values. Really, it is a great step from traditional interparental activities to international and modern systems. Another paper connects tourism-related entrepreneurial initiatives with the most marginalised peoples in the topic, "Empowering the tribal women in Kerala: Role of community-based eco-tourism initiatives through Kudumbashree Mission". Its authors suggest that this model is suitable for faster development of tribal populations. It opens before us an innovative idea. If the government takes initiatives for such a study, it will give us some fruitful results to make better policies for the development of that area and its marginalized people. Performance of Coastal area SHGs, problems of fishermen families are to be specially addressed, like low Job participation, low income, patriarchal family system, etc. Only their entrepreneurial capacity was analysed here. Another example of how women collectives are updating and strengthening using digital technology and its platform in making a knowledge community is highlighted in the research paper "Women empowerment in digital India and the Kerala knowledge economy". Digitalization of kudumbashree activities and marketing its products and services, and connecting with online trade is essential. Those areas are to be addressed in our studies. "Women's perceived social support through a self-help group: case study of Kudumbashree from the capital district of Kerala. Social Work with Groups," examines the level of social support provided by SHG membership by focusing on various socio demographic socio-demographic, as per the level of their involvement in SHGs. The study "Enhancing disaster resilience through women's self-help groups: A community-based study of Kudumbashree members" contributes to the understanding of Kudumbashree SHGs and emphasises their role in providing social support to the Kerala people in one of the major areas affected by natural calamities in 2018. So, the women volunteer team for disaster management is not only a trend but also it is an essential one. The disaster management system to be practised and developed throughout Kerala using Kudumbashree resources. Researchers employed a mixed-methods approach combining quantitative and qualitative data to assess resilience levels across different disaster management, particularly in areas like financial stability and community resilience-building in disaster-prone areas. Ultimately, the study advocates for the formalisation and strengthening of SHGs within disaster governance frameworks to improve overall preparedness and response. An innovative project named Ashraya was designed to find out the destitute population of the State, and in 2017, it was redesigned to achieve the target of a Destitute Free Kerala. The study focusing on the beneficiary awareness of the services available to Ashraya families is really worth one. All these are glimpses of the evidence of Kudumbashree's commitment and capacity to for the welfare of society. More studies based on participatory observation are to be promoted Kudumbashree itself to measure this successful evolution of its empowerment programmes and identify its challenges.

RESEARCH GAP

1-Many initiatives started by Kudumbashree as a part of women empowerment, social inclusion, and social welfare programmes. remedial and inclusive education programmes like Buds School for physically and mentally challenged students and Bridge School for tribal people etc, and coastal area programmes. They are not fully covered in the research journals, even though they focus on some important initiatives of kudumashree

2-Kudumbashree started many supporter wings like the auxiliary group, Balasaba, to help to fulfil their career dreams and bridge the generation gap in the younger generation. There is no mention of such studies



- 3-Many innovative programmes were initiated by Kudumbashree in microenterprise, incorporating internal markets utilising digital technology. More studies to be conducted utilising the possibilities of the global world and online trade, like Amazon and Flipkart, etc., to enrich the markets of Kudumbashree products
- 4-More studies to be conducted analysing the sustainability of Kudumbashree programme by analysing each program's success and failure, and suggesting suitable solutions to overcome it
- 5-A research gap exists in this field. More participatory and qualitative versus quantitative studies to be promoted by Kudumbashree itself to measure this successful evolution of its empowerment programmes and identify its challenges

CONCLUSION

Kudumbashree started many innovative programs utilising its rich women human resource by breaking all the prejudices towards women. When it started, it faced many social challenges and barriers. But its primary focus was on financial inclusion that led to their empowerment, moreover it was a government-supported NGO started under the State poverty eradication mission. Because of its back support, it started and strengthened its foundation. When it was covered with many central government schemes and programmes, it made miracles in women's empowerment. That's evidence we can observe here kudumbasgee Entrepreneur Initiative reached to tourism initiatives by understanding the possibility of Kerala's geographical and traditional attributes. Moreover, its attention reached disaster management too. But it doesn't mean all of its initiatives are successful and beneficium. But if we study those initiatives and projects systematically and academically, it will lead these women collectives to more efficient and innovative programmes in future, and the government can make a better plan for this, considering this peer review process and positive criticism.

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
